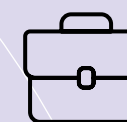

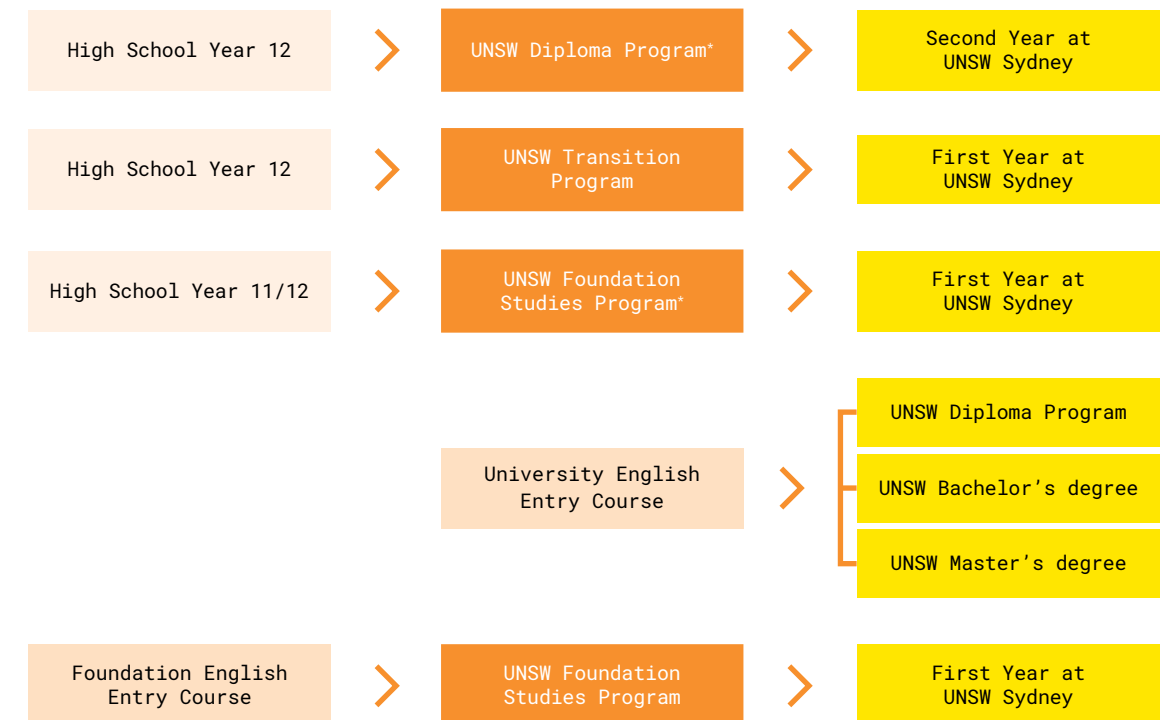

Learn about the local culture while living with an Australian family. You will have your own fully furnished room, access to all the facilities, and breakfast and dinner taken care of. Gas and electricity expenses are generally included in the rent.

The Australian Department of Home Affairs requires students to have the financial capacity to cover living costs of at least A\$26,000 per year (not including course fees). This means that you will need approximately A\$2,170 per month for accommodation, food, utilities and entertainment but the actual costs will depend on your lifestyle choices and needs. You should budget for around A\$31,000 per year per adult. Below is an estimate of how much your expenses will be each week.

Under 18 visa requirements

If you are under 18 years old and want to study in Australia, you can meet additional visa requirements in two ways.

1. Join the UNSW Global Under 18 Care Program. You will need to complete some forms to apply but our friendly Admissions team will guide you through the process.
2. Live with your parent or nominated guardian in Sydney. You will need approval from the Australian Department of Home Affairs.

Regular meetings with Student Advisers help keep your studies on track, and check in on your health and wellbeing, social life and accommodation. They also offer you the opportunity to ask any questions you may have.

Accommodation assistance helps you resolve any issues or change your living arrangements.

Enter Second Year at university

Equivalent to First Year
